

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY Community Health Needs Assessment, 2016 Update

Purpose of the Community Health Needs Assessment

The 2016 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) updates the CHNA completed in 2013 to meet the requirements of Section 9007 of the 2010 federal law, The Affordable Care Act ("ACA"). The ACA requires that any tax-exempt, IRS-designated 501(c) (3) hospital complete or update a publicly-available, comprehensive CHNA every three years in order to document the extent to which it understands the unique characteristics and needs of the local communities it serves, and responds to these needs by delivering meaningful and effective community benefit through clinical services and other programming.

Required Components

A CHNA report has five required components:

- 1) Definition of community served
- 2) A prioritized description of the significant health needs of the community
- 3) Transparency in the process and methods used to conduct the CHNA, including how it took into account input from the community served and prioritized community health needs
- 4) A description of the resources potentially available to address the identified significant prioritized community health needs
- 5) An evaluation of the impact of actions taken to address the significant health needs identified in the previous CHNA report (June 2013).

A CHNA report is considered complete when it is adopted by a governing body of the facility and made widely available to the public.

Community Served

NYC Health + Hospitals serve all New Yorkers in every neighborhood in New York City regardless of their ability to pay. Addressing disparity throughout New York City, NYC Health + Hospitals is *the* safety-net for the uninsured and underserved in New York City.

As a share of its total volume, NYC Health + Hospitals provides three times the percentage of ambulatory care to the uninsured than other New York City hospitals (27% and 8%, respectively) and twice as many ED visits (29% and 13%, respectively).

Together, Medicaid and uninsured patients, account for nearly twice as many hospital stays compared to other New York City hospitals (66% and 37%, respectively) (chart 1).




Chart 1: NYC Health + Hospitals Payer Mix by Service

The service areas of individual hospitals in the NYC Health + Hospitals System are identified in Appendix 1. A description of these communities, including demographic characteristics identifying vulnerable populations such as disabled and residency status, and health status such as chronic disease prevalence and the rate of potentially avoidable emergency health care use, is in Appendix 2.

Process and Methods

The process and methods was designed collaboratively by a work group of facility planning directors and other representatives.

The community served by each acute care facility is defined as the geographic area in which 75% of its ambulatory care patients reside. An initial list of over 40 health needs was identified based on a review of published literature and internal analyses that are publically available, including the 2013 CHNA and the DSRIP Community Needs Assessment. Incorporating input from other facility representatives and pilot tested with

hospital users, the initial list of health needs was reduced to 13 community health needs. Input from facility users (approximately 150 per facility were surveyed), Community Advisory Boards, facility leadership, and the prevalence of these health needs within the community were blended together to prioritize the health needs. The five highest priority community needs were considered *significant*.

Prioritized Significant Community Health Needs

All 13 identified community health needs were identified as important within the hospitals' communities according to community input. Those considered most significant, along with their priority order in accordance with regulatory requirements are indicated in blue in the table below. Hypertension/high blood pressure and diabetes are significant community health needs at all hospitals; obesity and heart disease are significant at the majority of hospitals (Chart 2).

Comparison of 2013 and 2016 Significant Community Health Needs

Most of the significant community health needs identified in 2013 were again identified in 2016. In both 2013 and 2016, a large number of hospitals identified diabetes, hypertension/high blood pressure, heart disease, obesity, mental illness and asthma as a significant community health need.

HIV/AIDS and other infectious diseases were considered a significant community health need at five hospitals in 2013, but none considered it among their most significant in 2016. A decrease in importance is consistent with the continued progress in reducing HIV/AIDS diagnoses and deaths in NYC.

Other changes in health needs identified between 2013 and 2016 are partly attributable to changes in federal requirements regarding methodology (see Process and Methods).

Resources Potentially Available

Appendix 4 is a listing of health and social service organizations available to members of low-income, medically underserved, and other minority populations in the neighborhoods included in the primary service area of NYC Health + Hospitals, by borough and sorted by neighborhood. These populations may experience health disparity or are at risk of not receiving medical care as a result of being uninsured or underinsured or due to geographic, language, financial, immigration status, or other barriers. Organization services provided are arranged accordingly into the following categories: Dental, Vision, Adult Day Health, Health Center, Insurance Enrollment, Home Health, Hospital, Nursing Home, Prescription Drug, Immigration Support, Mental Health-Inpatient, Mental Health-Ambulatory, Substance Use, Social Services, Financial Assistance, and Wellness/Prevention.

Evaluation of 2013 Implementation Plan

NYC Health + Hospitals evaluated each hospital's 2013 Implementation Plan and the impact of specific interventions that addressed identified health care needs (Appendix 3). Included in the evaluation is a list of the significant health needs identified in 2013, a description of the planned activities that addressed each of the health needs, an indication whether the planned activity was implemented, the target population and goal of the activity, and the impact or outcome of the activity.

2016 Implementation Strategy

The 2016 CHNA Implementation Strategy due in November 2016 will be designed to address the prioritized significant community health needs identified in the 2016 CHNA and must be adopted by the hospital's governing body.

PROCESS AND METHODS

Community Served

Each hospital's primary and secondary service area is defined as the zip codes that comprise the residence of 50% and 75% of its ambulatory patients, respectively.

Community Input

Community input was obtained using three different strategies:

1) Community Advisory Board

Community Advisory Boards (CAB) are the formal and direct links between each NYC Health + Hospitals facility and its patients and local advocates. The CAB members, consisting of residents, patients and community workers, represent the views of the community in the health care facility's decision making-process. Their purpose is to ensure access to the best possible medical care in their communities. The CAB members provide vital insight on the development of facility plans and programs, as well as keep the community informed of NYC Health + Hospitals' goals and objectives. All hospitals in the NYC Health + Hospitals system have a CAB which meets on a regular basis.

The CHNA report and process was presented to each CAB individually. A survey was administered anonymously and confidentially to each CAB member which asked them to indicate the relative importance of each of the 13 identified community health needs in their community (see survey instrument in appendix 6). These responses were coded for inclusion in the prioritization matrix. CAB members were also asked to provide additional input beyond the survey question.

2) Facility Users

NYC Health + Hospitals engaged approximately 150 adult facility users from each hospital throughout the main facility and within community-based clinic sites. These individuals completed a survey anonymously and confidentially with questions focused on demographics, health insurance status, language preferences, health concerns, primary and preventive health care utilization, barriers in obtaining ambulatory care and reasons for use of emergency care. Respondents were also asked to indicate the relative importance of each of the 13 identified community health needs in their community. These responses were coded for inclusion in the prioritization matrix.

Surveys were self-administered or administered by facility staff. The surveys were translated into NYC Health + Hospitals' top 7 languages: Bengali, Chinese (simplified), Haitian-Creole, French, Polish, Russian and Spanish. Participants received a two-trip Metrocard valued at \$5.50 for completing the survey (see survey instrument in Appendix 5).

3) Additional Community Engagement

NYC Health + Hospitals completed a community needs assessment in December 2014 as a requirement to participate in the Delivery System Reform Incentive Payment (DSRIP) program, a statewide initiative that focuses on improving health care delivery promoting community-level collaborations to ensure that Medicaid and uninsured populations receive culturally competent, highly integrated, well-coordinated, and easily accessible health services. As part of this needs assessment, the system collaborated with government agencies, numerous community organizations, engaged experts in the community and conducted focus groups with vulnerable populations. Key informant interviews were conducted with community experts having population-specific expertise, including particular immigrant groups, older adults, children and adolescents or expertise in specific issues, including supportive housing, care coordination, corrections, and homelessness (conducted as part of the NYC Health + Hospitals DSRIP Community Needs Assessment). Focus groups were conducted with community members recruited by community organizations which included targeted vulnerable groups such as older adults, local immigrant groups, LGBTQ and individuals with disabilities.

4) Facility Leadership

Hospital leadership were engaged to support the initial identification of potential community health needs, and refine the list to 13 needs which were used in hospital user and CAB member surveys. In addition, a survey was administered to hospital leaders which asked them to indicate the relative importance of each of the 13 identified community health needs in their service area (see survey instrument in Appendix 6). Finally, hospital leaders were asked to review the list of significant health needs identified by the CHNA process.

5) Publically available community health, socio-demographic, economic data

The CHNA work group reviewed all publically available data and supplemented with review of public health literature prepared by New York City's Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (including Take Care New York 2020), New York State Department of

Health (including NYS Prevention Agenda 2013-2018), federal agencies, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and Healthy People 2020. Sources of Data and Brief Description include:

Process and Criteria to Identify Health Needs

A work group composed of central office corporate planning staff, facility planning directors and other facility representatives from all hospitals in the NYC Health + Hospitals system was formed in April 2015 and met monthly to coordinate and conduct the CHNA process. To identify community health needs, the work group reviewed documentation from city, state and federal public health resources, including but not limited to Take Care New York 2020, New York State Prevention Agenda 2013-2018 and Healthy People 2020. The work group also reviewed facility 2013 CHNA and NYC Health + Hospitals DSRIP Community Needs Assessment reports. From this literature review, a list of over 40 potential community health needs were identified. To refine the list, the work group solicited input from other facility representatives and pilot tested the list with hospital users using a survey. The result of this process identified 13 community health needs as indicated below (note: this is not in priority order):

- 1. Heart disease, high cholesterol, stroke
- 2. Cancer
- 3. Diabetes
- 4. Asthma and other breathing issues
- 5. Hypertension/ high blood pressure
- 6. Violence
- 7. Mental illness and psychiatric disorders
- 8. Dementia including Alzheimer's
- 9. Obesity
- 10. Premature births, low birth weight
- 11. HIV, Hepatitis, STDs
- 12. Alcohol and/or drug use
- 13. Smoking

Prioritization of Community Health Needs

Hospitals developed their facility specific community health needs prioritization by ranking the community needs as determined by facility users, CAB members, hospital leaders, and the prevalence of the conditions within their respective communities – independently - to create an overall blended rank score of each community health need.

Facility users, CAB members, and hospital leaders completed a survey which asked them to rate each of the community health needs using the criteria: "Very Serious" = 3; "Somewhat Serious" = 2; "Not Serious" = 1. The option, "Don't Know/Not Applicable" was also provided and were excluded for that health need score.

Condition prevalence within the hospital service area was also a considered in prioritizing the community health needs. A 'z' score, which represents the distance/variance between the raw score (service area average) and the population mean (citywide average) in units of the standard deviation was calculated for each condition prevalence. A positive number suggests that service area experiences more prevalence in the area than the rest of the city, while a negative number suggest that there is less prevalence in the area relative to other NYC neighborhoods.

Each of the community health needs were assigned a rank from 1 to 13 by each of the three groups – hospital users, CAB members, and hospital leaders – based on their survey results. Community health needs were also assigned a rank from 1 to 13 based on their prevalence, using 'z' scores. Finally, each of the four ranks (Users, CAB members, hospital leaders, and prevalence) were added together and health issues were re-ranked based on their overall score.

Community health needs that were considered *significant* were ranked among the top five of identified needs. The final list, including the identified significant community health needs, were reviewed by hospital leadership.



Appendix 1: Description of NYC Health + Hospitals / Lincoln and Community Served


Located in the High Bridge-Morrisania section of The Bronx, NYC Health + Hospitals / Lincoln's primary service area includes the neighborhoods of Mott Haven, Hunts Point, Highbridge and Morrisania (zip codes: 10451, 10542, 10454, 10455, 10456 and 10459). The secondary service area includes Crotona/Tremont, Fordham/Bronx Park and Pelham-Throngs Neck (zip codes: 10457, 10453, 10460, 10458, 10468, 10472 and 10473).¹ The map below shows the primary service area in red and the secondary service area in light red. Other NYC Health + Hospitals sites are identified in gray. The NYC Health + Hospitals / Lincoln service area encompasses many neighborhoods that the federal Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) has identified as being medically underserved and/or or having a shortage of health providers (HPSA).² NYC Health + Hospitals / Lincoln is specifically located in (Medicaid) Dental, Mental Health, Primary Care HPSAs and the Morrisania medically underserved population.



¹ Primary and Secondary Service area is defined as the Zip codes that comprise the residence of 50% and 75% of its ambulatory patients, respectively.

² A Medically Underserved Area /Population (MUA/P) designation applies to a neighborhood or collection of census tracts based on four factors: the ratio of primary medical care physicians per 1,000 population, infant mortality rate, percentage of the population with incomes below the poverty level, and percentage of the population age 65 or over. A Healthcare Provider Shortage Area (HPSA) is a collection of census tracts that has been designated as having a shortage of health professionals. There are three categories of HPSAs: primary care (shortage of primary care clinicians), dental (shortage of oral health professionals), and mental health (shortage of mental health professionals).

NYC Health + Hospitals / Lincoln provides a disproportionate share of services for the borough's low income and uninsured population. In 2014, 17% of its ambulatory visits and 23% of its ED visits were uninsured, compared to 12% and 16% at Voluntary hospitals in The Bronx. In addition, 68% of its inpatient discharges were either uninsured or enrolled in Medicaid, compared to 51% at Voluntary hospitals in The Bronx.

Facility Size and Patient Volume

With 139,680 patients and 596,905 encounters (FY 2015), Lincoln is a full service hospital with 362 certified beds. In FY 2015, it had 24,000 discharges including nearly 2,000 newborn deliveries, 162,000 Emergency Department visits, and 409,000 ambulatory visits.

Patient Demographics

Fifty-seven percent (57%) of NYC Health + Hospitals / Lincoln patients are female and 43% are male. Among total patients, 20% are under age 21; 32% are ages 21-44; 32% are ages 45-64; and 16% are aged 65 and older. System-wide, fifty-seven percent (57%) of patients are female and 43% are male. 19% are under age 21; 31% are ages 21-44; 34% are ages 45-64; and 15% are aged 65 and older.

The hospital is racially diverse, with 63% of patients identifying as Hispanic or Latino; 28% as Black Non-Hispanic; 4% as Multi-Race/Other; and 3% of patients declining identification. System-wide, 40% of patients identified as Hispanic or Latino; 34% as Black Non-Hispanic; 8% as White Non-Hispanic; 7% as Multi-Race/Other; 6% as Asian or Other Pacific Islander; and 5% of patients declining identification.

Potentially Preventable Visits (PPVs), based on proprietary 3M software, are emergency visits for ambulatory care sensitive conditions (ACSC) that may result from a lack of adequate access to care or ambulatory care coordination. These ambulatory sensitive conditions could be reduced or eliminated with adequate patient monitoring and follow up. Unlike with PQIs, which can be disease specific, there is only one PPV indicator which represents all potentially avoidable ED visit regardless of condition or disease.

PPV Events are observed or "actual" ED visits that meet the criteria of an ACSC visit as defined by the 3M software. The Observed Rate is the number of PPV events divided by the population. Risk Adjusted Expected Visits are PPV visits adjusted by age, gender and race/ethnicity. The Expected rate is the number of Expected visits divided by the population. Risk Adjusted Expected Rate is the observed PPV rate divided by the expected PPV rate, multiplied by the statewide PPV rate. A lower number is better.

Appendix 3. Evaluation of 2013 Implementation Plan

A. HEALTH NEED: ASTHMA

Interventions:

- Provide Comprehensive Asthma Care and Access to Care through Adult Asthma and Allergy Clinic
- Manage Patients' Symptoms and Reactions to Asthma Attacks through Lincoln's Asthma Team
- Develop Asthma Action Plans to Define Patients' Treatment Regimens

The Bronx RESPIRAR Asthma Coalition Program is a New York State grant funded program based at Lincoln Medical Center. Our mission is to reduce asthma disparities and improve the outcomes of asthmatics in the Bronx by promoting culturally sensitive and evidence-based best practices through patient, healthcare, and community partnerships. RESPIRAR, which means Breathe in Spanish, is also the acronym for Resources, Education, Self-Management, Prevention and Integration to Reduce Asthma Rates.

Our Goals:

- Reduce asthma-related ED utilization and hospitalization by early identification of high risk asthma patients and provide them with an integrated community-based intervention that focuses on education and care coordination.
- Increase community capacity and resources to improve the availability, accessibility, and coordination of asthma awareness and educational programs and support services.
- Develop and maintain a regional a regional asthma coalition that will bring sustainable improvements to reducing the asthma burden in the Bronx.

Our Current Clinic Projects at Lincoln Medical Center:

- Pulmonary Clinic
- Pediatric General Clinic
- Adult Inpatient Unit
- Pediatric Inpatient Unit
- Adult Emergency Department
- Pediatric Emergency Department

The Bronx Regional Asthma Coalition (BRAC) Team at Lincoln Medical Center utilizes an Asthma EMR note with decision support, integrates an Asthma Action Plan into regular care, implements monthly monitoring and provides feedback on key asthma measures via provider and department reports.

The Asthma Case Management - Community Health Worker Program, which is funded by New York City Department of Health Asthma Initiative, is based at Lincoln Medical Center. This Program falls under the umbrella of The RESPIRAR Program (Bronx Asthma Coalition). The purpose of the program is to: educate families regarding asthma triggers in their homes, conduct environmental assessments, and reinforce remediation efforts. The population of focus is patients with asthma recently discharged from the Pediatrics ED.

For FY 2015, a total of 75 families were recruited and enrolled by two (2) CHWs into the Community Health Worker program within a period of Nine (9) months. Of these 75 families, 39 completed baseline Emergency Department (ED) assessment and the required four (4) home visits plus thirty-two (40) of those families were referred for IPM Services, eight (8) families refused the IPM Services. An additional two (2) families had a baseline ED assessment and three (3) home visit completed and IPM services were provided.

B. HEALTH NEED: ALCOHOL AND DRUG USE

Interventions:

 Conduct Assessments and Motivational Interviews to Substance Users through the Program to Address Substance Abuse (PASA)

PASA consists of an inpatient addiction medicine team which provides specialist level care to patients at Lincoln Hospital with substance use disorders, as well as technical assistance/support for staff. The team consists of Board Certified Internist/MD, who is also board certified in Addiction Medicine, Pain Medicine, Hospice and Palliative Care and 1 Certified Substance Abuse Counselor (CSAC). Approximately 60-80 inpatient consultations are performed each month by the physician to address medical detoxification, medication assisted treatment and pain management for substance using inpatients. The CSAC sees 15-20 referred patients daily for screenings, he provides brief interventions utilizing motivational interviewing techniques and individualized referrals for drug treatment. The majority of patients are also referred to the Lincoln Recovery Center for intensive outpatient counseling. The efficacy of medication assisted treatment and risk of overdose is discussed with opioid dependent patients and referrals for methadone or buprenorphine maintenance provided. Eligible patients are picked up from the hospital or escorted by the PASA CASAC for inpatient detoxification or rehabilitation services provided by St. John's Riverside Hospital or Harlem Hospital with good retention and completion of the programs offered.

The PASA program is involved in several exciting initiatives at Lincoln Hospital, including naloxone distribution for patients at risk of overdose from opioids and a peer program to address alcohol use, both are based in the ED and are funded by the NYC DOH. PASA provides assessments (SBIRT) as indicated for the designated Lincoln Medical Center trauma program patients who screen positive for alcohol and/or other substance use, using motivational interviewing technique to reduce injury recurrence. PASA refers all eligible inpatients patients to the Lincoln Medical Center Health Home Care Coordination program to be enrolled during their hospital stay with virtually 90% acceptance of enrollment. Enrolled patients can receive enhanced social services: case management and care coordination to help with follow up and attendance at outpatient medical/drug treatment facilities when discharged. A Quality Improvement Initiative is being introduced to implement the use of measureable outcomes recently developed and released by the American Society of Addiction Medication and other bodies.

Interventions:

Provide Services to Individuals with Chemical Addictions through Recovery Center

The Recovery Center, along with our Adult and Geriatric Outpatient Center, provide treatment for individuals who are experiencing both mental health and substance abuse issues (MICA). They provide service to individuals with chemical/alcohol addictions. Medical evaluations are provided on site by a Psychiatrist who is board certified in chemical dependency/substance abuse, along with individual and group counseling. Unique to the Recovery Center, a certified Acupuncturist is on board who uses Reiki as a holistic treatment modality.

. Provide Short Term Crisis Intervention Services through Mobile Crisis Unit to Adults, Children and Families

Lincoln's Mobile Crisis Unit (LMCU) is clinically linked to the Psychiatric Emergency Services to facilitate evaluations and/or admissions as needed. The LMCU is geared toward the provision of an alternative treatment that supports reduction of acute psychiatric distress and the subsequent need for admission to psychiatric inpatient and/or emergency room services. This program received grant funding beginning April 14, 1987. Mobile Crisis services emphasize utilization of community-based mental health programs for persons in need of non-emergency psychiatric services.

The goals and objectives of the LMCU are to provide:

- Services with the intention, when possible, to prevent hospitalization and to maintain stabilization and connection to mental health services within the community.
- Rapid crisis assessment and psychiatric evaluation which is used to determine the appropriateness of the overall plan of care and/or need for referral.
- · Stabilization and acute treatment.
- · Linkages with appropriate mental health treatment and/or other interagency support systems deemed appropriate.
- Supportive counseling and psycho-education to persons in crisis.
- Increase the individuals' capacity to manage their health & wellness, live a self-directed life, and reach their fullest potential by providing consumer-directed, recovery-oriented services.
- Peer support and counseling focused on crisis resolution and recovery from mental illness and substance abuse disorders.

The LMCU consists of three components, 1) Child and Adolescent, 2) Adult and 3) Consumer Participation, which all function to serve as a vehicle to offer short-term, mental health services for persons difficult to engage within their community who may have been unable to successfully maintain stability. The Child and Adolescent component places emphasis on meeting the needs of persons in the 0-18 age range, and the Consumer Participation component incorporates the supportive services of a peer counselor.

LMCU is unique in that it provides visits to individuals in their homes or current place of residence who may be in crisis or who have become disconnected from their outpatient mental health treatment provider. Services provided by the LMCU include in-the-field psychiatric evaluation; rapid assessment of strengths, problems and needs; as well as treatment, which may include medication services that are appropriate to their assessed needs; psycho-education; and referral to appropriate treatment and support. The LMCU functions to provide a short-term link between inpatient and/or outpatient services for patients in need of additional psychiatric support and services while reducing the rate of psychiatric inpatient re-admission and emergency room visits. In addition, Peer Counselors (Community Liaison Workers) provide support and counseling focused on recovery from mental illness and substance abuse disorders.

The LMCU makes home visits to individuals unable to access services on their own, in order to deliver direct in-home patient care assessments and treatment. The LMCU participates in systematic approaches to continuous quality improvement (CQI) and performance-based outcome measures as part of the quality improvement efforts within the Department of Psychiatry. The program will increase the individuals' capacity to manage their health & wellness, live a self-directed life, and reach their fullest potential by providing consumer-directed, recovery-oriented services. The program will maintain information on co-occurring disorders and will offer the availability of services (direct or indirect) pertaining to mental health and substance use. All staff should have an understanding of recovery and co-occurring disorders, and understand the supports and interventions needed.

C. HEALTH NEED: ACCIDENTS

Interventions:

 Provide Community Outreach Educators, Preventative Health Assessments, Emergency Department Assessments and Substance Abuse Intervention through the Injury Prevention Program

Guns Down Life Up (GDLU), a cure violence model was launched on September 23, 2015, and is managed by Lincoln Medical Center's Injury Prevention Program.

Lincoln Medical Center's Injury Prevention Program has partnered with Save Our Streets, South Bronx (SOS) and the 40th and 42nd Prescient's, in efforts to reduce gun violence in the S. Bronx community. The SOS team (Violence Interrupters) has been working closely with the Lincoln ER Nursing staff and Hospital Police and are available to support our patients and patient's family members, who've been victims of Trauma.

The mission of GDLU is to save lives through the empowerment of communities—young people, families, organizations, and community members—by providing positive activities, mentorship, and resources. GDLU is NYC Health + Hospital's response to violence in New York City, bringing together HHC's health experts and community-based organizations to move healing beyond hospital walls and break the cycles of violence.

The GDLU Program model consists of three components: (1) a hospital-based, trauma-informed, injury prevention, alternatives-providing, social empowerment component; (2) the complementary Cure Violence intervention component; and (3) the coalition of community stakeholders (Circle of Safety). The hospital-based prevention work draws on NYC Health + Hospitals' staff members and local community

resources to provide opportunities for youth to engage in positive activities, such as sports, dance, and the arts to occupy their otherwise free time and remove them from potentially violent circumstances.

Recognizing that trauma is central in violence reduction work, our GDLU Programs use a trauma-informed approach. This means recognizing the signs and symptoms of trauma in the young people who participate in our programs and responding by creating safe, trustworthy, supportive, collaborative, cultural sensitive, empowering spaces for them to recover and move beyond their trauma. Injury prevention is at the core of our GDLU Programs, as we aim to keep young people out of harm's way and recognize that intervening before the onset of violence improves outcomes more effectively and with less intensive treatment. Preventing injuries also minimizes the trauma that families and communities experience, prevents young people from being incarcerated, and reduces medical costs.

Alternative activities are the foundation of GDLU Programs, providing young people with positive activities to fill their otherwise free time. The activities are meant to engage young people, keep them invested in the program, and divert them from violence, which creates time and space for them to grow in a positive environment. Social empowerment is the process of developing agency, self-confidence, self-esteem, and self-awareness, which facilitate the ability to imagine and aspire to a better future. Instilling this sense of competence, usefulness, and belonging is necessary for positive youth development and GDLU Program lessons are infused with lessons that create this sense of personal value and power.

The Injury Prevention team has also partnered up with the Bronx Borough President, Rubin Diaz and District City Councilwoman, Vanessa Gibson and given out a total of 400 book bags to students in an effort to "keep kids safe" in the South Bronx. Councilwoman Gibson also awarded Lincoln's Injury Prevention Program the Green Rock Foundation Award, for our extensive efforts to prevent violence in the South Bronx.

D. HEALTH NEED: DIABETES

Interventions:

Provide Education Programs Focused on Type 1 and Type 2 Diabetes

The Diabetes Center of Excellence at Lincoln Medical Center is accredited by the American Association of Diabetes Educators (AADE). The specialized program provides self-management education that meets national standards for quality care, according to AADE's Diabetes Education Accreditation guidelines. It offers a culturally competent and patient centered bilingual curriculum that focuses on type 2 diabetes, obesity and the prevention of complications from the disease.

The AADE's re-accreditation recognizes the outstanding work of our skilled diabetes team whose exceptional knowledge and dedication provide patients with increased understanding of diabetes and self-management of the disease. In view of the reported rise in diabetes-related mortality, we are gratified that our Diabetes Center of Excellence has been implementing a curriculum that emphasizes the prevention and management of diabetes complications especially cardiovascular disease, one of the leading causes of mortality among persons with diabetes.

In an effort to advance its outreach and educational efforts, the program has instituted a Diabetes Education Advisory Board composed of a multidisciplinary group of health care professionals, administrators, community members and patients. Our teaching strategies are tailored to the culture and language of each patient while emphasizing healthy eating, exercise, effective use of medications and regular healthcare visits to help with the management of this chronic disease.

We're taking a proactive role in the prevention of Retinal Disease by increasing retinal screening rates to ensure early diagnosis and management of diabetic retinopathy, an eye disease that can lead to blindness but which is treatable with early detection and intervention. The DSMT (Diabetes Self-Management Training) program which is accredited through the AADE is offered to qualifying patients. Patients that qualify for the DSMT program are then admitted and are tracked in a more specific way where they must have 3 visits with program instructors. Once they are considered as completing the program, we work with the patient to determine if they will continue to need follow-up visits regarding their DSMT. Throughout their visits staff track certain metrics to report to the AADE. We also employ patient-centered care, using the AADE7 Self-Care Behaviors (diabetes overview, healthy eating, reducing risks, monitoring, taking medications, healthy coping, being active) to guide our visits. We work interdisciplinary with referrals to programs in the community, and internally to social workers, nurses, and physicians, as indicated. Patients are also encouraged to attend the group diabetes education classes that are offered twice a week, two hours each, also covering the AADE7 topics.
